

# International Virtual Conference on 'Language Teaching beyond the Classroom: Issues and Perspectives'

The Centre for Linguistics, SLL&CS, JNU in collaboration with Central Institute of Indian Languages, Mysore will be organizing a Two-Days International Virtual Conference on **'Language Teaching Beyond the Classroom: Issues and Perspectives'** on 21-22, August 2020, and a **panel discussion** on **'Issues and Challenges in Language Teaching'** on 22 August, 2020.

## Concept Note

There are different approaches and methods in language teaching, for example, the Grammar Translation Method, the Direct Method, the Audio-Lingual Methods, and the Communicative methods, etc. It is observed that the use of a single method may not guarantee desired outcomes. Besides factors such as: a teacher, classroom, syllabus, and techniques adopted by the language teaching institution; the level of motivation, and other social and psychological factors for language learning are also important. Rivers (1982) suggested a few objectives of language learning namely (a) developing intellectual powers (b) reading of classical literature and philosophy for personal growth (c) understanding how languages function (d) engaging in reading comprehension and essay type descriptions (e) understanding and communicating better with people from all over the world and (f) developing oral and writing skills. Even in the present context, the objectives of language learning remain need-based or reasons of prestige. Learners choose to learn a language for better job prospects, including professions that entail translations or interpretations, for social mobility, for traveling abroad, and so on.

In a country like India, where multilingualism is a norm rather than an exception; language teaching is a challenging task. The dominant position of constitutionally recognized scheduled languages poses a challenge on one-hand as one relates it to the diverse Indian cultural milieu. On the other, it brings inertia to the speakers of lesser-known languages of India. The school, college, and University curricula also show apathy towards learning another Indian language or any minority language of India.

The virtual conference aims to focus on the language learning/ teaching courses (regular, part-time, diploma, or online courses) primarily undertaken for the higher Academic Level (that is, the Colleges and Universities) in India. Explanations are sought for questions raised by the language experts. Pertinent questions such as:

1. What should be the goals of language teaching?
2. Should a language course try to teach Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing or aim to find proficiency through conversational drills, translations, or some other skill?
3. What approaches, methods, techniques, and activities work best, and under what circumstances?
4. What should be the role of the native language in a multilingual language learning setting?

The virtual conference aims at a high degree of participant involvement and encourages critical enquiry and debate related to issues of language learning/teaching (online and offline) beyond the classroom, its pedagogies, goals and future directions.

### **Call for Abstract/Paper**

Prospective authors are invited to submit abstract/paper for oral online presentations only. They may provide their original and unpublished research in the following aspects:

The abstract should be limited to 500 words (excluding the references). It should be typed in MS Word, Times New Roman, 11 pt. Font, single spacing with one-inch margins on all sides. The abstract must be anonymous and must not include the names of the authors, affiliations, designations, etc. Only one single-authored or joined authored abstract will be considered for the peer-reviewed process.

# Abstract and Paper Submission Guidelines

The following are the guidelines for the abstract and paper submission:

## A. Abstract Submission Guidelines

The abstract should be anonymous, and it should not contain the name, designation, or affiliation of the author. It should be limited to 500 words, excluding references typed in M.S. Word, Times New Roman, 11 point Font, single spacing with one-inch margins on all sides.

## B. Paper Submission Guidelines

### 1. Font & Sizes

- Font: Times New Roman
- Font Size: 12
- Paper Title: 16
- Chapter Heading/Title: 14
- Text: 12
- Footnotes: 10 (line spacing 1)

### 2. Line Spacing: 1.5 (body text)

### 3. References & Bibliography: APA Style

Surname, Name. (Year of Publication). Title of the book/journal/article in italics. City: Publisher.

### 4. Table/Graph/Image etc.

Sources must be furnished under the table/graph/image etc. as captions.

### 5. Author Details

Author details must be furnished in the following order under the paper title (Font size 10):

- Name
- Designation
- Affiliation
- Email Id
- Contact

## **6. Special symbols, Diacritics**

If your paper includes lots of symbols, IPA, Diacritics, or a different writing system, please submit a word copy as well as a pdf copy.

## **7. Paper length**

The maximum length of your paper should be 10-12 (4000-4500 words) pages, including your References/Bibliography and Appendices in 1.5 line spacing (Times-News Roman).

## **8. Paper format and sequence**

The paper must follow the following sequence:

- Title of the paper
- Author details
- Abstract
- Keywords
- 1. Introduction
- 2. Research Methodology
- 3. Main Paper body/Chapters/headings
- 4. Findings/Analysis/Conclusion
- Acknowledgements
- References/Bibliography
- Appendices
