Concept Note

Terrorism has been one of the most persistent and complex threats to India's national security. Over the decades, India has confronted diverse forms of terrorism—cross-border militancy in the Jammu, Kashmir, and the Ladakh region, insurgencies in the Northeast, left-wing extremism, and their sophisticated urban terror networks. These threats have evolved gradually with a definite scope, intensity, and operational methods that are motivated by technological innovation, shifting geopolitical realities, and the globalisation of radical and extremist ideologies. Furthermore, the post-9/11 and 26/11 global security environment has reshaped the very nature of these modern terror threats.

In recent years, particularly since 2014, the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) came to power under the leadership of Narendra Modi as Prime Minister, India's counter-terrorism strategy has undergone a major transformation. At the same time, India's outreach to the international counter-terrorism platforms has strengthened diplomatic leverage against state-sponsored terrorism, particularly by Pakistan.

However, this transformation in the counterterror strategy has given birth to new and more complex security dilemmas—hybrid warfare tactics. Terrorists and extremist groups are nowadays using digital platforms to spread their vested interests. The regional and international environment further complicates India's security calculus. The geopolitical context, such as the resurgence of the Taliban in Afghanistan recently, has demanded a new anti-terror strategy.

Against this backdrop, the proposed National Conference on “Transforming India's Counter-Terrorism Strategy in the Amritkal: Emerging Trends and Security Dilemmas” seeks to provide a multidisciplinary platform for various stakeholders. The representatives can also be able to critically examine the shifting contours of the terror threat and India's evolving response mechanisms. The conference will evaluate the effectiveness of India's anti-terror measures and identify both execution and policy-level innovative strategies that can enhance its resilience and response capability.

Overall, the conference deliberations are expected to bring positive insights for strengthening India's counter-terrorism strategy in the face of dynamic threats. The multiple perspectives together are expected to bridge the gap between policy formulation, operational execution, and academic research, as well as contribute towards making India more secure and resilient towards new waves of terrorism. The outcomes are also expected to strengthen India's position in the global fight against international terrorism.
